Welcome to our school.

I am so pleased that you are considering our school for your child's education. You will find that Romsey Abbey is distinct from other Primary schools in the Romsey area in a number of ways.

We are a school of about 200 pupils which means every member of staff knows every child really well. We know their abilities, their interests and their needs, so we can provide every child with the right support and encouragement to ensure they realise their full potential. My staff and I also know all of our parents well and I very much value and encourage their involvement in their child's learning journey.

As a Church of England school, we have a distinct Christian ethos, which has caring and friendliness at its heart. Many people in our local community recognise and value our unique ethos. Our pupils come from many different cultures and faiths; we welcome the cultural and ethnic diversity that this brings to our school.

We continually strive to drive up the quality of our teaching, by adopting best professional practice, and by regularly inviting external experts to advise us about ways to further improve. Each child's progress is carefully monitored and I review this regularly with the teachers, to ensure that we are providing the appropriate level of support and encouragement to meet the needs of each child. As a feeder school for Romsey School, we liaise closely with them, to ensure a secure transition for those Year 6 leavers who go there.

Behind the Victorian façade of our school lies a complex of new, bright and airy classrooms, a large playing field with an all-weather running track, a woodland play area, safe play areas for the youngest children and playgrounds for the older ones. We use Romsey Abbey as an extension of our buildings; holding lessons, concerts and services there.

Children achieve extraordinary things at Romsey Abbey. All our children learn in a safe and friendly environment and they love coming to school each day. We stimulate the children with exciting new learning experiences and challenges; they have many opportunities to compete in sports competition, act in plays or perform in our excellent choir or orchestra.

OFSTED, at their Inspection in May 2019, clearly liked what they saw. They have rated the school as GOOD overall, and our Year R as OUTSTANDING

Habits of mind

We teach all our children the skills that they will need to become successful and thoughtful learners. These Habits of Mind, as they are called, help the children to reflect, question, think things out, to work in a team, and to persevere.



Once learned, Habits of Mind will help the child throughout their future education, and in later adult life, to learn new skills, to adapt, and to prosper. They are:

Curiosity:

to explore, discover and ask questions **Empathy:**

to understand and care how other people feel **Resilience:**

to never give up; keep on having a go Self-management:

to make good choices, to be ready to learn and set goals

Collaboration:

to work together as a team and to share ideas **Creativity:**

to be imaginative, to take risks and to solve problems

Reflection:

to think problems through and decide what to do next.

These Habits of Mind are now well established in the minds of all our children, and in the culture of the school.

We use glove puppets to help the youngest children remember each Habit.



Teaching and Learning

Achieving excellence in teaching is a core goal at Romsey Abbey Primary School.

We continually strive to drive up the quality of our teaching, by adopting best professional practice, and by regularly inviting external experts to advise us about ways to further improve and to assess the effectiveness of the teaching in our school.

We maintain a relentless focus on the children's progress in the core subjects in the National Curriculum - Reading, Writing and Mathematics. Alongside the core curriculum, we also teach the full range of National Curriculum ancillary subjects such as History and Geography throughout the year and these lessons are enriched with external visits whenever appropriate. The curriculum for each class is set out in detail on the school's website.

Learning is supported by an excellent school library, state of the art Information Technology, modern visual aids and interactive white boards.

Homework is an integral part of learning, and assignments are set each week to consolidate each childs' learning in class. To help busy parents, we offer a lunchtime homework club and an opportunity for some extra tuition groups for those that need it.

Early Years Foundation Stage (Year R)

Our priority within the Early Years Foundation Stage is to provide a safe and happy environment for our children in which they feel loved and enjoy learning.

Before starting school, our Early Years team get to know the children through a number of different opportunities. We offer story time sessions, visit the children in their preschools and homes and invite parents into school to meet their teachers. This allows us to assess every child's individual needs and to see what really inspires them; providing the Early Years team with the vital information they need to support each child.

When the children begin school, we strive to bring their safe and loving home environment into the classroom. At each stage, we work in partnership with parents, always encouraging and valuing their contributions. In the reception classroom, the children learn through planned, purposeful play, both indoors and out. Whilst we ensure that there is a balance of adult-led and child-initiated activities, the majority of our learning takes place through free-flow play. This maximises opportunities for the children to learn through decision-making; fostering independence and self-confidence. Through the online learning journal, Tapestry, parents are able to follow and contribute to their children's learning.

Our curriculum is broad, balanced, relevant and creative. To instil a love of learning, we ensure the children's interests underpin the teaching of the seven areas of the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum. Our practice is also shaped by the four Early Years guiding principles, the framework and Characteristics of Effective Learning. This enables us to take a holistic approach to each individual's learning and development. For more information, please see the Early Years Foundation Stage Policy on our website.

Children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND)

We will identify, at the earliest possible opportunity, whether a child has special educational needs. Our SENDCO and various staff members are trained to conduct a range of standardised tests and these assessments are used by the SENDCO to inform the teachers understanding of the needs of the child and the interventions that will help.

As soon as possible, the child's parents will be invited to meet the teacher who will inform them that their child has been placed on the SEND Register, discuss the outcome of the tests and the provisions that will be made to help their child. We aim to have a well-informed and collaborative relationship with the parents of children with SEND from the outset, as teamwork is the best way to get the best outcomes for the child.

We want children with SEND to participate in lessons fully and effectively with the rest of their class, as this is where they learn best. We also encourage them to participate in every aspect of life in the school, such as sports, field trips, music and performances and they do so successfully and happily and benefit from it.

The school is fully equipped with access aids for children with physical disabilities.

Monitoring your child's progress

Your child's learning will be continually monitored in the classroom by the teaching staff, where it is recorded and the results and trends are reviewed regularly by the Head Teacher at Pupil Progress meetings with their teacher.

At these meetings, the progress that your child has made and his or her level of academic attainment, will be carefully considered by the Head Teacher and his staff and provision made for any additional focussed learning support that your child may need, or to help your child progress further to the Higher Standard. You will be invited to meet your child's teacher once a term to review their workbooks, to learn about their progress and to discuss how you and the school can work together to provide your child with the best possible support for their learning.

In addition, the you can make an appointment with your child's teacher during the term to discuss any problems as and when they arise.





Our Wider Curriculum

The school is renowned for its outstanding music teaching. We have an excellent choir, which is in great demand to sing at concerts and in support of charity events throughout the area.

All children have the opportunity to learn a musical instrument and peripatetic teachers provide tuition for all the orchestral instruments, from flutes through to the double bass. Not surprisingly, the school also has a fine orchestra, which has also won many prizes in local competitions.

French is taught throughout Key Stage 2. As the children progress through the school they become proficient and confident in speaking a foreign language and learn about French culture and traditions. As a school we place high value on Global Learning and seek to make links to life in different locations and cultures across the world in all areas of our curriculum. We enjoy particularly good links with the village of Kasese in Uganda. We aim to support all children in becoming responsible and informed global citizens.

Lessons are supplemented and illustrated with many school visits, such as those to the Hillier Arboretum to observe science at first hand, or to Brownsea Island, or to the Southampton Central Mosque. We use the Abbey as a resource, as it provides many insights into history, from the Anglo-Saxons through to the Reformation, and Year 5 spends a night there as a residential.

A forest-style school is held in our own woodland at the rear of the school, where the children learn about nature and woodcraft.

We provide high quality wrap around care for children from 7:45am to 5:30pm. This can be booked and paid for in the school office.



Sport

Romsey Abbey Primary has a commitment to sport and physical exercise as a means of children becoming physically confident and maintaining a good level of health and fitness.

Sports and exercise are part of the curriculum, in which children are taught to swim and to take part in games of football, netball, hockey, basketball and athletics.

Throughout the school year, we also offer a variety of after-school sports activities which vary from one term to the next but can include; gymnastics, football, dance, netball, running, and cricket.

Together, these provide the children with opportunities to enjoy sport, and to compete in intra and inter school competitions, which helps to build character and to embed values such as fairness and respect.

We have extensive and beautiful playing fields at the rear of the school, with an all-weather running track, football pitches and a woodland area.

Sportsmark's assessement of our Sports provision has become consistently excellent and we achieved their Gold Award again in 2022. Our sports teams are also regularly awarded certificates for respect, team work and self-belief at local competitions.

Our Governors

We have an energetic and fully-engaged team of Governors at Romsey Abbey, several of whom are teachers themselves.

The Governing Body meets every month to review the progress of every aspect of the school's activities to ensure that standards are constantly improving and that our children are receiving the best possible education.

All Governors visit the school several times each term to monitor and report on the progress of the School Improvement Plan, to monitor adherence to our safeguarding and safety policies, and to provide active support to the Head Teacher and his staff.

We encourage dialogue with our parents at every opportunity and welcome their views about the school and especially on any aspect where we could do better.

Working with Parents

Our school has developed an energetic community of its own. Spearheaded by our wonderful PTFA, our parents play a vital role in making our school a friendly and vibrant place.

We also hold regular parent forums where parents can discuss matters that affect the whole school or a particular year group. It is an opportunity to provide feedback, share ideas and shape the ongoing development of school life. These meetings are open to all parents but each class also have parent representatives, selected via the PTFA, who will bring any matters to the meeting shared with them by other parents of that class. We welcome feedback throughout the school year.
